What is your most memorable moment as a student? I met my wife in first year at Queen's, but it's tough to narrow down a single moment together. Breakfasts at Ban Righ, studying together, watching her walk across the graduation stage...too many to count!

What motivated you to stand for election for University Council? I have two primary reasons for being involved in University Council – supporting & advancing Black equity (and more broadly, DE&I) at Queen's and having a platform to support young alumni as they transition from Queen's to the workforce, given the stresses of the pandemic. It's encouraging to see the progress we've made on DE&I at Queen's and as well the programming to help young grads, but of course we're in the early innings for both of these efforts. For young grads' transitions to the workforce, now is a particularly tough time for finding employment, given the labour market squeeze (primarily in tech but also other sectors), and I've seen grads have full-time offers rescinded. I'm looking forward to staying involved in both topics and helping out where I can!
