1. Preamble		
The Centre for Neuroscience Studies (CNS) is the focal point of a centre for research and scholarship in neuroscience, whose scope will encompass elements of all aspects of neuroscience across campus. The Centre and the program are unique. The research component is built on diverse technology and multidisciplinary approaches to neuroscience. Interdisciplinary training and education integrate research excellence with a strong career orientation.

	Founding members of the CNS were members of the Interfaculty Steering Committee.	
4.	Administrative Structure	
	4.1 Administration	
	A Director and an Executive Council administer the CNS.	
	4.2 Appointment of the Director	
	The Director is appointed by the Principal of Queen's University on the recommendation of Vice-Principal (Research) Queen's University.	
	The Director serves for a term of five years, which is renewable.	
	4.3 Election of Executive Council	
	The Members of the CNS nominate and elect representatives from among the Membership to serve in the faculty positions on the Executive Council.	
	Eligibility to sit on the Executive Council will be restricted to Members in good standing. The Council is comprised of the Director, a graduate student and a minimum of five elected members, with a balanced representation from the Faculty of Arts and Science and Faculty of Health Sciences.	
	4.4 The Role of Director	
	The Director:	

- Serves as Chair of the Executive Council
- Acts as the liaison between Council and the University
- Reports directly to the Vice Principal (Research)
- Submits reports on the work of the CNS to the University at prescribed intervals
- Implements pertinent governance regulations of the Senate

Responsibilities Include:

- Advancing the objectives of a research program identified by a critical mass of investigators, coherence and research excellence.
- Identifying general and specific research goals and developing a strategic plan for the Centre.
- Developing budget and staffing proposals for the Centre.
- Inform Heads of Departments of contributions of faculty members who are involved with the Centre.

4.5 Powers and Functions of the Executive Council

The Executive Council functions as the planning and priorities authority for the CNS and will be advisory to the Director. It also has a sub-committee structure in the following areas: research, education and training, relations with the private sector (industry and institutional investors), and fund-raising Executive Council Members serve on sub-committees, and sub-committee membership is

	drawn from among all Members of the CNS.	
	4.6 Advisory Board	
	In order to remain responsive to the needs of, and new developments within, the research communities in academia and in the private sector, the CNS will establish an Advisory Board whose membership will be drawn from the sponsoring Faculties, from the broader university community, and from the private sector. Advisory Board members will possess expertise in areas relevant to the scientific training and commercialization thrusts of the CNS.	
	4.7 Amendments to the Constitution	
	All proposed amendments are submitted to the Director, followed by a consultative process prior to being brought to a vote by Members. A two-thirds majority vote is required to amend the Constitution. All amendments and amending procedures will be in accordance with relevant University policies, procedures and guidelines.	
5.	Relationship to the University	
	The CNS will be governed by the Senate of Queen's University, and following specified constitutional procedures outlined in Section 4 above, will submit reports at prescribed intervals to maintain liaison with the University.	
	The CNS is reviewed, at least once every five (5) years, by a committee appointed by the Vice-Principal
