Appendix B

Women's Studies Departmental Name Change

Rationale: All core faculty, staff, and the DSC representative in the Department of Women's Studies have recently voted to change our departmental name from Women's Studies to Gender Studies. Our rationale for this change is as follows:

- Noticing the recent shift from Women's Studies to Gender Studies and/or Women's and Gender Studies,
 which has occurred in multiple academic institutions, naming ourselves Gender Studies signals the most
 recent and cutting edge debates in the fields of Women's Studies, Feminist Studies, and Gender Studies.
- The shift to Gender Studies, importantly, points to an opening up of gender categories—thus
 encompassing racial, gendered and sexual diversity. Notably, women do not go missing in Gender
 Studies, but rather are understood in relation to and necessarily part of complex social networks and
 heterogeneous political identities.
- With the first cohort of Gender Studies MA candidates arriving to Queen's University in Fall 2009, we
 will maintain strong linkages between the undergraduate program and the graduate program; naming both
 the undergraduate and graduate programs Gender Studies will demonstrate academic, intellectual, and
 institutional coherence.
- The Department of Women's Studies has researched the proposed name change for roughly seven years. Investigations into other feminist departments by faculty, from year to year, as well as student demands (one of which resulted in a questionnaire and follow-up analysis), also reveal that the proposed departmental name, Gender Studies, speaks to contemporary debates in social theory and emphasizes the foci through which many faculty and students are thinking about their research projects. The proposed name change also points to our already existing openness to diverse intellectual approaches to the ways in which gender is constituted in our global world—as seen in departmental vision, our curriculum, our administering of the Sexuality and Gender Diversity Certificate, and our campus events (invited speakers, student activities, and publications).
