

HISTORY TEACHING FELLOWSHIP POSITIONS FOR 2010-2011

The History Department invites applications for teaching fellowship positions for Spring/Summer 2010 and Fall/Winter 2010-2011. The specific undergraduate courses to be taught will be selected from the list below.

At this time, applications are only being invited from PhD students currently enrolled in the Department of History, who have or will have successfully defended their thesis proposals by the end of Winter Term 2010. All students currently in Year 3 and beyond of their PhD programme, who seek internal financial support of any kind in 2010-2011, are expected to apply for these positions.

If the number of qualified applicants exceeds the number of courses available, priority will be given to students who are in their funding eligible years (i.e. through PhD year 4). Priority for teaching their own seminar course (as opposed to sections of HIST 121, 122, and 124) will be given to students in their funding eligible years who have not previously taught their own seminar and whose supervisors agree that they are ready to do so.

Applicants should submit an up-to-date curriculum vitae and a short note or email from at least one referee, normally their supervisor, as well as any other materials they consider relevant (such as a teaching dossier or student evaluations). Applicants already holding a teaching appointment in the Department need only submit a letter of interest if they are willing to allow material already on file to be used in their assessment. All applicants should list, in rank order of priority, all courses that they consider themselves qualified to teach. The list of courses is tentative. Not all of these courses will be offered (indeed only a small proportion of them will be offered). The department may also make substitutions in the coming months. A very limited number of "Topics in History" proposals (HIST 390-396 and 400-403) may be considered: please include a detailed draft syllabus if you wish to propose a course.

It is likely that the History Department may still have unfilled teaching needs after all Teaching Fellowships have been awarded. At that time, the Department will post a general advertisement for Adjunct Faculty positions. (Applications have already been received from Term Adjuncts eligible for a General Right of Reappointment under the Collective Agreement—they do not need to apply a second time). Recent PhDs who are already teaching in the department but who do not have a General Right of Reappointment are welcome to submit their applications now, understanding that current PhD candidates will be considered first.
