We are never critical of others work. We listen, learn and support. People often write biographically with humour and pathos. Be it fact or fiction the stories are memorable.

We meet on the first Wednesday morning of the month, enjoy tea, coffee, snacks and even though the last two years have been a struggle, we have been able to email our stories, meet at private houses and now at long last gather in our QWA house. New members are always welcome.

The QWA contributes to four bursaries at Queen's:


- Stephanie Deutsch Award

The very first donation by the Faculty Women's Club was given to the local chapter of the I.O.D.E in 1940 to purchase newspapers and magazines for the German nationals and prisoners of war interred at Fort Henry.

A Bit O'History

"No lasting achievement is possible without a vision and no dream can become real without action and responsibility" - W.B. Yeats.

The Faculty Women's Club of Queen's (FWC) came into being on 14 January 1939 and immediately began to draw up a constitution. However, World War II was declared in September so the Club's emphasis became the local war effort.

From 1940 to 1946, members:

- manned the Red Cross Sewing Rooms, one day a week
- sold War Stamps at the Capitol and Tivoli Theatres
- participated in the War Services' Speakers'
 Committee
- worked at the Victory Club Canteen one day every three weeks
- joined the Soldiers' Entertainment Committee
- sponsored dances for British airmen stationed at Collins Bay
- knitted a total of 3,555 articles scarves,
 gloves etc. for service personnel overseas
- formed an Emergency Committee to make all necessary arrangements for hosting British children being sent abroad to escape the intense bombing in England. In a matter of days, 28 members offered to take in children.
