



### ENGL 100 TA Group 1: Andrew Law

### Strengths

- Textual Knowledge: Consistent demonstration of understanding of the primary source.
- Elements of Fiction: Effective integration of the Elements of Fiction into arguments; clear demonstration of understanding of the Elements through language and terminology.
- MLA Style: Attentiveness to the conventions and requirements of MLA style.

### Weaknesses

- Claims: Paragraphs should open with a specific argumentative claim, rather than an observation about the text or summary of its plot.
- **Theme:** A theme is a full idea, not just a single-word topic.
- Wordiness: Academic prose is at its strongest when it is clear and direct, and should avoid unnecessary words or descriptions.

## ENGL 100 TA Group 2: Jacob Morrow

### Strengths

- Clarity: Clear and concise writing helps communicate your ideas and arguments more effectively.
- Quotation Integration: By integrating quotations into the grammar of your own sentences, your reader can follow your points more easily.
- Tone: Professional but not clinical, efficient but descriptive; tone is a fine balance to strike in academic essay writing.

### Weaknesses

- Intentional Fallacies: Remember to centre the text, not the author, as the source of meaning.
- Significance of Arguments: When crafting your claims, challenge yourself to go one step deeper into the text's meaning.
- MLA Style: Check Purdue OWL for more information on how to format your in-text citations and Works Cited page.

## ENGL 100 TA Group 3: Nikolai Rodrigues

### Strengths

- Elements of Fiction: Demonstrated an understanding of the Elements of Fiction.
- **Evidence:** Effective selection of useful quotations from the text as evidence.
- Quotation Integration: Quotations integrated neatly and cleanly into the grammar and syntax of sentences.

#### Weaknesses

- Thesis Statements: Insufficiently argumentative thesis statements
- Claims: Claims that are observational or descriptive rather than argumentative
- Formatting and Presentation: Violations of Formatting and Presentation Instructions


Please adhere to the following special formatting and presentation instructions. Students will lose 2% per violation of these instructions:

- Please use only the Times New Roman font, size 12.
- Please use only 1" margins.
- Please use only Canadian spelling (i.e., not American spelling).
- Please double-space the entire assignment, including all headings, titles, block quotations, and the list of Works Cited.
- Rather than a title page, use the first four lines at the top of the assignment to indicate 1) student's full name, 2) the instructor's name, 3) the course code, and 4) the date.
- Please include a descriptive title for the Essay, centred immediately below the headings.
- Please number pages on the top, right-hand corner of the page, with surname.
- Please include a list of Works Cited at the end of the assignment, formatted according to MLA style.
