


- Michi Saagiig Nishnaabeg writer, scholar, and musician; distinguished Visiting Professor of Sociology at TMU

- a major influence in her creative work is traditional Indigenous fiction (308)



The Earth Diver Myth


- a creation myth, also known as a cosmogonic myth, a symbolic narrative about the origins of the world and/or humankind, connected to Indigenous spiritual traditions and oral narratives
- in most versions of the Earth Diver creation myth, a deity awakens and sends an animal—the Earth Diver—from the primordial realm into primal waters to seek mud or sand with which to build habitable land for humankind—the Earth
- often, Earth Diver myths are elaborately plotted, including accounts of various failed attempts by the animal to create habitable land, before an eventual solution to creation is found
