



## View the Collection

Distinguished Canadian philanthropist and entrepreneur Seymour Schulich and Queen's University Principal, Daniel Woolf have partnered to gift their personal collections of rare books to Queen's. In recognition of their generosity and vision, the university has established the Schulich-Woolf Rare Book Collection, which resides in Douglas Library, and combines more than 400 volumes from the personal collections of Mr. Schulich and Principal Woolf. Mr. Schulich has also made an additional \$1-million gift towards the establishment, growth, and preservation of the collection. The strength of the Schulich-Woolf Rare Book Collection is history and culture of the 16th through 18th centuries. There are also fine examples of books on other topics including Canadiana, travel and exploration.



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## What are Rare Books and Special Collections?

- Age alone does not make a book special or rare
- Rarity depends on the importance of the text, physical characteristics, condition of the book, demand, provenance, signatures, inscriptions, marginal annotations

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## How do rare and special books come to reside at Queen's?

- Gifts-in-kind; donation offers are considered first by a librarian/curator for suitability/relevance
- **Endowed funds**; monetary investable assets which can be spent consistent with the wishes of the donor
- **Increased scarcity and monetary value over time**; some books become rare over time and are transferred out of circulating collections





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## Robertson Davies Collection

Born and raised in Ontario, Davies was educated at Upper Canada College, Queen's University at Kingston and Balliol College, Oxford. During his time in Kingston, he cultivated his interest in journalism as an active contributor to *The Journal*, the Queen's University student newspaper. Robertson Davies had three successive careers: as an actor with the Old Vic Company in England; as publisher of the *Peterborough Examiner*; and as a university

professor and founding Master of Massey College at the University of Toronto. As a novelist, he gained worldwide fame for The Salterton Trilogy, The Deptford Trilogy, The Cornish Trilogy, Murther & Walking Spirits and The Cunning Man.

Comprised of more than 5000 volumes, theatre prints and ephemera, this remarkable collection reflects Davies' interests in literature, literary criticism, art, music, theatre, theatre criticism, theatre biography and autobiography, film, drama, history and psychology. Many of the volumes are annotated with handwritten notes inserted. Particular strengths are in 18th, 19th and 20th century theatre books and prompt copies. Items in this collection are either signed or first editions. The items will be shelved according to room order in which they were kept at Windhover, Davies' country home in Caledon Hills.

All items can be located in the finding aid .

The Robertson Davies collection has been preserved in its entirety and made available to the public through the generosity of Hugh Anson-Cartwright in memory of Reginald Anson-Cartwright (Queen's School of Mining, 1904), and through the support of the Chancellor Richardson Memorial Fund.






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

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## Can a book and/or printed material be a primary source?

**Primary source:** a first-hand record of an event or topic created by a participant in or a witness to that event or topic. Records created or written closest to the time of the actual event are the most useful sources.

**Secondary source:** second-hand information written or created after an event by people who were not at the original event.

## Books as primary source materials, the book as artifact, books as history

## Consider:

- *Substance* (size; parchment vs. paper; binding materials)
- *Content* (the text is it readable?; illustrations relation to subject matter?; evidence of readership marginalia, inscriptions?)
- Form (condition; columns of text; size of margins, stylistic choices)

## Also consider:

- *Sense* (how do sensory observations affect your experience?)
- Think (how do the book's features relate to how it conveys information?)
- Feel (your subjective response; what can you infer from the book?)





## **Asking Questions**

**iding Question**: simple, often with a yes/no answer. It often starts from the stem of who, what, when, w, where, or why. It always ends with an answer. We can usually answer a guiding question by looking one source. Sometimes called "closed" or "thin" question.

sential Question: makes us think more. We will have to search for the answer and may have to analyze veral sources to craft a response. The answer will require at least one full sentence and often more to ly explain. A yes/no answer will not suffice. Sometimes called "open" or "thick" question.
