

## Land Acknowledgement

This territory is included in the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee and the Confederacy of the Ojibwe and Allied Nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. The Kingston Indigenous community continues to reflect the area's Anishinaabek and Haudenosaunee roots. There is also a significant Métis community as well as First Peoples from other Nations across Turtle Island present here today.

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





- ^ Students must complete the Financial Aid and Awards Profile, self-identify during the application process via the Ontario Universities' Application Centre, and provide Queen's with verification of Indigenous status to be considered for Indigenous financial aid and awards.
- + Available to students who accept their offer of admission before the deadline and apply for residence and pay the residence deposit by June 1, 2026 4 pm ET.



# Your Journey Starts Here

#### Applying to Queen's as an Indigenous Student

Queen's welcomes and values Indigenous students from across Turtle Island. If you identify as First Nations, Inuit, or Métis, you can choose to apply through the Indigenous Student Admission Pathway, a process designed to support your application and offer access to dedicated scholarships, supports, and transition resources.

#### Your Guide to Applying Through the Indigenous Student Admission Pathway:

1. Apply to Queen's through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC)

- 1. Self-identify as Indigenous on your OUAC application. You'll find an optional section to share this information.
- 2. Submit verification of Indigenous status to Queen's. Deadline: March 31, 2026

- 1. Meet the admission requirements for your program. Each program has specific academic requirements – be sure to review them.
- 2. Complete the Supplementary Application (if applicable). This is required for applicants to Commerce, Health Sciences, and Nursing
- 3. Apply for residence and pay your deposit by June 1, 2026 at 4 PM (ET).



## Accessing Queen's Scholarships, Awards, and Bursaries

The process involves 4 easy steps.

Applications for Queen's awards are found on your SOLUS Student Centre.



#### Apply to Queen's

To maximize the number of scholarships, awards and bursaries you will be considered for, we suggest you apply by mid-November.



#### Submit the Financial Aid and Awards Profile

This will cover many awards based on academic achievement, financial need and involvement in your school or community. Apply early to be considered for the most award opportunities. The suggested deadline is February 15.



#### Submit the Major Admission Awards Application

If you demonstrate leadership, involvement in your school or community, or—in some cases—financial need, consider applying for a Major Admission Award. These are high-value awards, that are renewable for four years, while you complete your undergraduate degree. Apply no later than December 8.



#### **Optional: Commitment Scholars Award Application**

If you are a leader in, and committed to, racial and social justice, or diversity initiatives, this award might be for you. The application deadline is February 15.

# Principal's Scholarship



These scholarships are automatically awarded to students whose admission averages place them in the top 3% of the competitive admission average\* for each direct-entry program. These merit-based scholarships are granted on the basis of academic performance.

\* Competitive averages will vary by program, and may also vary from year to year.

Future domestic Queen's students are encouraged to submit the Financial Aid and Awards Profile. Through this single application, you will be considered automatically for need-based, grade-based, or activity and participation-based awards. By completing the Financial Aid and Awards Profile, you will be considered for more than 1,000 different awards, including the large-value and renewable awards below.

Students admitted through the Indigenous Student Admission Pathway may also qualify for an admission scholarship.

#### Queen's Work Study Program

Students demonstrating financial need may be eligible to work part-time on campus during their studies through the Queen's Work Study Program.

#### **External Awards**

External awards are offered by employers and organizations, and often look at criteria other than academics; aspects such as athletics, extracurricular activities, leadership, community involvement, volunteer work, and areas of specialization are highly considered. Some common places to look for external awards are your own (or your parents') employers or unions, clubs or associations you may participate in, and national award programs. Do your research early! Application deadlines vary.

## **OSAP** and Band Funding

Queen's accepts financial support from both the Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP) and Band Councils.

#### **OSAP**

A government program that provides grants and loans to help cover tuition, books, and living expenses. Most Ontario students are eligible to apply. You can submit your OSAP application online - the earlier, the better.

#### **Band Funding**

Many First Nations Band Councils offer post-secondary funding for eligible members. You'll typically need to complete a funding application through your Band's education office. If approved, funding is sent directly to Queen's to help cover your costs.

## **Government Student Assistance Programs**

You may be eligible for student financial aid in the form of grants (money you do not have to repay) and loans (money you need to repay when you are no longer studying full-time in a government funding-approved program).

- · You must be a Canadian citizen, permanent resident, or protected person
- · You must demonstrate financial need
- · You will need to apply each year of study, as soon as the application is available
- · Apply for government student financial aid through the province or territory you reside in (not the province where you plan to attend university)
- · Refer to government student assistance websites for your province or territory for details and deadlines

# Convocation

At the end of your undergraduate studies, you will graduate with a Bachelor's degree and enter a world of possibilities.

In honour of your accomplishments as an Indigenous graduate, you will be gifted a blanket during your convocation ceremony. You are also invited to Four Directions Indigenous Student Centre to participate in a long-standing and meaningful tradition of adding your handprint to the convocation canvases hanging in the centre. After you graduate, you may go directly to a career or begin further studies in a graduate or professional program. Whatever path you choose, you will be part of an alumni network of more than 150,000 graduates worldwide.
