"Sex and Gender in Political Behaviour Research"

Elizabeth Goodyear-Grant (Ph.D. McGill) is an Associate Professor in the Department of Political Studies at Queen's University, and the Director of both the Queen's Institute of Intergovernmental Relations (IIGR) as well as the Canadian Opinion Research Archive (CORA). Her research focuses on Canadian and comparative politics, with particular interests in electoral politics, voting behaviour, and public opinion; news media; and the political representation of women. She is the author of *Gendered News: Media Coverage and Electoral Politics in Canada*, which won the 2016 Pierre Savard Award from the International Council of Canadian Studies, and was one of three books shortlisted for the Canadian Political Science Association's 2014 Donald Smiley Prize.

Stéfanie von Hlatky is an Associate Professor in the Department of Political Studies at Queen's University and the Director of the Queen's Centre for International and Defence Policy (CIDP). She has published in the Canadian Journal of Political Science, International Journal, European Security, Asian Security, as well as the Journal of Transatlantic Studies and has a book with Oxford University Press entitled American Allies in Times of War: The Great Asymmetry (2013). Her most recent book, Going to War? Trends in Military Interventions (co-edited with H. Christian Breede) investigates the reasons why countries enter conflicts (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2016). Stéfanie von Hlatky is the founder of Women in International Security-Canada and current Chair of the Board.

Margaret Little is an anti-poverty activist and academic who works in the area of poverty, welfare reform and anti-poverty activist politics. She is jointly appointed to Gender Studies and Political Studies at Queen's University and is the 2013-18 Peacock Professor of Gender and Politics. The Peacock has given Dr. Little the opportunity to engage in a long-term project about marginalized women's activism in Canada during the 1960s to the 1980s.
