Directors Message

I am delighted to write this letter to you—my first as SURP's 7th Director.

Professor John Meligrana stepped down as Director in July after leading the School through the extraordinarily challenging pandemic years with calm competence and good humour. John is now enjoying a well-deserved leave, recharging his batteries to return to full-time teaching and research.

The 2024-25 academic year is off to a great start. Dr. Carolyn DeLoyde joined SURP as a tenure-track Assistant Professor in July. Professor DeLoyde has already made an immediate impact at the School, enhancing the equity, diversity, and inclusion components of our core curriculum and enriching our environmental planning courses with her extensive professional experience in the field.

Last year, SURP successfully relaunched two of its outstanding international experiential learning opportunities: an India project course and a student exchange program in New Zealand. This year, we are working to expand our international offerings with another India project course and additional student exchange opportunities.

Prof. David Gordon continues to take first-year M.Pl. students, or "newbie SURPers," on educational and fun-filled field trips to Toronto, Montreal, and Ottawa. A new highlight this year was Hamilton, the site of the 2024 OPPI conference.

Our students continue to impress, winning highly competitive awards from CIP and OPPI this year. Additionally, 7 SURPers were awarded Tri-Council grants to conduct research for their Master's Reports and Theses.

Employment prospects for SURP graduates remain strong. Nearly all students secured paid professional internships in the past two years, and over 95% of graduating students found professional employment within six months of completing their M.Pl. degrees. We are deeply grateful to the School's alumni for their invaluable support of our internship program.

Finally, the future of SURP looks brighter than ever, as our alumni continue to make extraordinary contributions to planning Canadian communities.




International Education and Research:

FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Maxwell Hartt was promoted to Associate Professor, with tenure and also completed his accreditation as a Registered Professional Planner (RPP). Maxx has developed the <u>Population and Place Lab</u> into a busy hub of research activity attracting graduate students and co-authoring many articles and books. His research profile was rewarded with an appointment as has been appointed as an Associate Editor of one of the world's leading planning journals: the *Journal of Planning Education and Research*.

Professor Patricia Collins continued her SSHRC-supported research on the impacts of school closures, with new articles In the journals *Wellbeing Space and Society* and *Canadian Geographer*. Professor Collins is taking a well-deserved sabbatical in Fall 2024 and will return to teaching in January 2025.

Professor Ajay Agarwal was elected Vice-President/President-elect of the Shastri Indo-Canadian Institute, a binational organization promoting academic collaboration between India and Canada. Ajay also hosted a campus visit from the Indian High Commissioner to Canada.

Professor David Gordon's three new refereed articles on planning the Canada's suburban land-scape served as the basis for articles in the *Globe and Mail*, *La Presse*, *The Conversation*, TVO and the *Winnipeg Free Press*. After the explosion of misinformation on 15-minute cities, CBC Radio invited him to make a cross-country series of broadcast interviews explaining the concept in 12 cities. Dave continues to teach a range of courses, edit Canadian Planning and Policy, lead field trips, and convene alumni gatherings. Students and alumni recently surprised him with a birthday party in Hamilton.

NEW FACULTY MEMBER

The most important news for 2024 is that Dr. Carolyn DeLoyde RPP MCIP was appointed as a tenure-track Assistant Professor after an international search. Carolyn is a SURP graduate with over two decades of professional experience in environmental and land use planning. She is a skilled teacher, with many years' experience as a university instructor, most recently within the undergraduate geography and Master of Science in Planning program at the University of Toronto. Professor DeLoyde has already revamped our planning theory course, expanding its emphasis on equity, diversity and Indigeneity and will be updating

environmental planning courses in the upcoming term. Her infectious enthusiasm is a great addition to the atmosphere at the School.

Dr. DeLoyde's current research is focused on cities and the natural environment, Natural Heritage Systems, and community engagement. She is currently working with Dr. Betsy Donald on Kingston in Focus, an online interactive dashboard created by Queen's University in collaboration with the City of Kingston. The project has already attracted financial support from the university's Fund for Scholarly Research and Creative Work.
