

Fellowship Program Pilot 1

CRYSTAL FUNG AT SI CANADA

Congratulations to Queen's undergraduate student **Crystal Fung**, who successfully completed an eight-month Fellowship with **Social Innovation Canada (SI Canada)** under the academic supervision of **Dr. Carolyn DeLoyde**. Crystal was awarded \$30,000 as part of the *Mitacs Business Strategy Internship* program, and contributed to SI Canada's **Financialization of Housing Lab** project.

Acknowledging the ever-changing landscape of school and work that post-secondary students are navigating, the Elevating Student Engagement in Social Innovation Across Canada Fellowship Program (SI Fellowship), ran for the first time in 2022, aiming to help youth and young adults meaningfully enter the workforce. Students were connected to a national cohort of peers, mentors, and community leaders to build their professional network and participate in supplemental skill building workshops focused on transferable skills required to thrive in today's world.

Crystal's work with the Financialization of Housing Lab centered on engaging cross-sectoral stakeholders and experts, working together on specific problem areas to generate prototypes that captured opportunities and addressed barriers that have resulted from the Financialization of Housing. The Muslim Societies, Global Perspectives (MSGP) Project invites you to join a conversation with Jamal Saeed about his recent memoir, <u>My Road from Damascus</u>, on Wednesday, March 1 at 6:30-8:30 PM in Mac-Corry D216.

Jamal Saeed spent 12 years as a prisoner of conscience in Syria before being invited to Canada in 2016. He continues to raise awareness about Syria's ongoing civil war and humanitarian crisis through his work as an activist, editor, visual artist, and author. He lives in Kingston, ON.

While many prison memoirs focus on the cruelty of incarceration, My Road from Damascus offers a tapestry of Saeed's whole life. It looks squarely at brutality but also at beauty and poetry, hope and love.
