From 1838 to 1938, there were thousands of cows living in Kingston. They contributed to the city, but residents gradually came to see cows as a problem. Cows wandered onto people's properties, diseases were sometimes spread through milk, and they became associated with waste spaces. Over time, the control of cows increased, and the urban cow eventually disappeared from the city.

Canada Research Chair (CRC) Competition

The Queen's Vice Principal of Research Office has launched an Open CRC Competition, which is now live on the **VPR CRC Opportunities website**. This competition will seek to fill institutional CRC vacancies to ensure fulfillment of Queen's CRC equity targets, while using a streamlined approach that will ensure both diversity of candidates and prioritization of research excellence. As such, this competition is limited to applicants who self-identify with one or more of the four federally designated groups (as defined by the Tri-agency), including women and gender minorities, racialized minorities, persons with disabilities, and Indigenous Peoples.
