

Julianah Adediji to Receive IHSS Award



Congratulations to Julianah Adediji, PhD student working under the academic supervision of Dr. Neal Scott. Julianah is the recipient of a 2023 Travel Award from the International Humic Substances Society (IHSS), which is recognized as a world leader in fostering scientific education and research, and promoting public understanding of humic substances (complex, heterogeneous mixtures of polydispersed materials formed in soils, sediments, and natural waters by biochemical and chemical reactions during the decay and transformation of plant and microbial remains).

In addition to the IHSS Travel Award, Julianah will be honoured with the **Ronald Malcolm Award**, presented by the IHSS to the most outstanding applicant for a Travel Support Award. Julianah will receive the prize when she travels to Santiago, Chile for the IHSS Conference in August. Well done, Julianah!

Rachel Herron Awarded Julian M. Szeicz Award for Early Career Achievement

Congratulations to **Dr. Rachel Herron**, who received the **Julian M. Szeicz Award for Early Career Achievement** at the annual meeting of the **Canadian Association of Geographers** in Montreal on May 11, 2023. Rachel completed her PhD in the Department of Geography and Planning at Queen's University in 2015, under the supervision of Professor Mark Rosenberg. Dr. Herron is the **Tier II CRC in Rural and Remote Mental Health**, and founding Director of the **Centre for Critical Studies of Rural Mental Health** at Brandon University. The Julian M. Szeicz Award for Early Career Achievement was created to honour Dr. Julian Szeicz, a faculty member in the Department of Geography and Planning at Queen's who was tragically killed in an avalanche while completing field work.

GEOGRAPHY FIELD SCHOOL 2023

The Geography Field School was held in conjunction with McGill University from April 29 to May 14 with a focus on Desert Ecosystems. 24 students (18 McGill and 6 Queen's) were accompanied by McGill Profs. Chris Buddle and Cynthia Kallenbach, Prof. Ian Strachan from our Department and McGill Course Coordinator Mr. Vinko Culjak Mathieu, and Postdoc Dr. Catherine Scott. Five vehicles were each driven ~3500 km by the course leaders, transporting students and equipment to a variety of field camps at the Grand Canyon, Picacho Peak State Park, Usery Mountain Regional Park, Joshua Tree National Park, and the Desert Studies Center in Zzyzx, CA. Many day trips were used to explore features and landscapes within the Sonoran and Mojave Deserts, including the Arizona Sonoran Desert Museum, Tonto National Monument, Salton Sea, and Algodonis Dunes.

Within the course, students were required to complete a "Be The Teacher" presentation on a selected topic at an appropriate location within the trip, lead/participate in nightly summaries, contribute to all aspects of the group field camp (cooking, cleaning, organizing...), complete a Natural History Journal and in the final three days, develop, pitch, implement, and present a group research project. All students successfully negotiated all activities within the course. The Queen's students integrated well within the welcoming McGill community and completed projects with McGill students. The groups were complementary, and each learned from the other (the majority of the McGill students lean towards organismal ecology while the Queen's students are more ecosystemsbased in their background).

To say that this course is a life-changing experience for the students is an understatement. In this intensive course, the students were pushed - sometimes to their limit – but rose to the challenge, learned new things, applied existing knowledge, and made lifelong friends. Ian, Chris, and Cynthia are already planning the next iteration..."We can't believe that the course has ended and are all looking forward to 2025!!"
