## 'Rainforest IV' at the Grand

In 1973, a group of young emerging artists came together in a workshop with **David Tudor** and cocreated a new, large-scale version of his sound work Rainforest. This eventually became known as Rainforest IV, hailed in histories of media arts as the unique and historic piece which also spawned Tudor's group "Composers Inside Electronics."

Fifty years later, another workshop in July brings together participants of all levels of experience to learn about the piece through making and performing it, in Kingston Ontario Canada. Workshop leaders include sound artist Matt Rogalsky and sonic geographer Laura J Cameron from Kingston, in addition to sound artist Dimitri Georgaras from Ottawa. The workshop is a project of Queen's Dan School of Drama and Music.
