"Persistent Places: A comparative geoarchaeological approach to prehistoric hunter-gatherer landscapes"

• When: Tuesday, March 26, 2024, 10 - 11:30 am

In this talk, Dr. Maher discusses case studies from fieldwork in Jordan and Cyprus to illuminate the value of frameworks of transported landscapes and landscape learning in considering how Southwest Asian prehistoric hunter-gatherers and early farmers interacted with the world around them.

Lisa Maher received her PhD in Anthropology from the University of Toronto and was a SSHRC Post-Doctoral Fellow and Research Associate at the University of Cambridge. She joined the faculty of the University of California, Berkeley, in 2012. With a focus on prehistoric archaeology and geoarchaeological approaches to reconstructing human-landscape interactions, her research explores the 'life-history of place' and how landscapes are created through people's relationships with each other, the environment, and the material world.
