GNDS 810: Black Geographies/Abolition Geographies Instructors: Katherine McKittrick and Ruth Wilson Gilmore

Overview

This course is co-taught by Drs. McKittrick and Gilmore and will bring together graduate students from Queen's University and the City University of New York Graduate Center.

The classes will be held on Zoom, Wednesdays from 4-7.

Course Description

We will read scholarship that shows how people in various time-space configurations made the dynamic, flourishing presence Ruth Wilson Gilmore has termed abolition geography. What did people do? How, with whom, and to what end? What antagonisms created boundaries and barriers? What are the roles of ideology, culture, and environment? To think through possible answers, we will closely examine how scholars use disciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches to shape and investigate questions, and how they combine theories, objects, and methods. Key concepts include but are not limited to: racial capitalism, political parties, narrative structure, class formation, social reproduction, livingness, modernization, internationalism.
