<p><b>Course Description</b> What is feminist theory? Why is it important, how is it useful? Who engages in theory-making? How has feminist knowledge production been shaped by elements of power and privilege? We will explore the ways in which feminism is -- and has always been -- a multi-vocal, non-linear discourse shaped by local and global sites of feminist formation.
