

TEACHING POSITION AVAILABLE – Winter 2022

HIST 241 - TIH: Modern Germany Department of History Queen's University, Kingston, ON CAN K7L 3N6

The Department of History at Queen's University invites applications from suitably qualified candidates interested in teaching "Modern Germany from Unification to Reunification" (HIST 241), which is being offered on-campus in the Winter term of 2022 and will take place on Wednesday's from 1:00 p.m.-2:30 p.m. and Friday's from 11:30 a.m.-1:00 p.m. This is a second-year lecture course with an expected enrolment of 125 students. Candidates must have a PhD as well as teaching experience at the University level in German History. This is a winter term appointment for the period 1 January 2022 to 30 April 2022.

The University invites applications from all qualified individuals. Queen's is strongly committed to employment equity, diversity and inclusion in the workplace and encourages applications from Black, racialized/visible minority and Indigenous/Aboriginal people, women, persons with disabilities, and 2SLGBTQ+ persons. All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply; however, in accordance with Canadian immigration requirements, Canadian citizens and permanent residents of Canada will be given priority.

The University will provide support in its recruitment processes to applicants with disabilities, including accommodation that takes into account an applicant's accessibility needs. The academic staff at Queen's University are governed by the Collective Agreement between the Queen's University Faculty Association (QUFA) and the University, which is posted at <http://www.queensu.ca/facultyrelations/faculty-librarians-and-archivists/queens-qufa-collective-agreement>.

To comply with Federal laws, the University is obliged to gather statistical information about how many applicants for each job vacancy are Canadian citizens / permanent residents of Canada. Applicants need not identify their country of origin or citizenship, however, all applications must include one of the following statements: "I am a Canadian citizen / permanent resident of Canada"; OR, "I am not a Canadian citizen / permanent resident of Canada". Applications that do not include this information will be deemed incomplete.

Applications should be submitted as one single PDF file and include a cover letter and complete curriculum vitae; any teaching evaluations from courses previously taught; and any other relevant materials the candidate wishes to submit for consideration such as a teaching dossier. Applications should also include letters of reference from two referees. **Please arrange to have applications and supporting letters sent directly to:**
