KEY MILESTONES

END OF FIRST-YEAR

MAY - Declare History Major/Medial Plan

JULY - Course registration for second year

- Explore your Academic Requirements Report on SOLUS while course planning (pg.4)
- Mid-July: Enrollment appointments open on SOLUS
 - Enroll in one yearlong core seminar (pg.3)

END OF SECOND-YEAR

JULY - Course registration for third year

- Review your Academic Requirements Report
- Early July: History's Advanced Course Selection
 - Be sure to check your queensu.ca email in June/July for details
- Mid-July: Enrollment appointments open on SOLUS

END OF THIRD-YEAR

MAY - JUNE - Review remaining degree requirements

- Schedule an appointment with an Academic
 Advisor in History at hist.undergradequeensu.ca
 to make sure you're on track to satisfy your degree
 requirements by the end of fourth-year
- Review your Academic Requirements Report

JULY - Course registration for fourth year

- Early July: History's Advanced Course Selection
 - Be sure to check your queensu.ca email in June/July for details
- Mid-July: Enrollment Appointments open on SOLUS

Starting in second year, students are eligible to enroll in History's internship course: HIST 212:

Experiential Learning in Historical Practice.

Starting in third year, students are eligible to enroll in History's Archives Internship Courses: HIST 501 and HIST 502.

Students going into
fourth year are eligible
to apply for an
Independent Research
course in History: HIST
514, 515, and 517.



NEXT STEPS: CORE SEMINAR

2022 COURSE REGISTRATION: JULY 18 - 22

During course registration this summer, all students who have declared a History Major or Medial and are entering their second year of study **must enroll in a Core Seminar.** The Core Seminar is a yearlong course numbered from **HIST 300 to HIST 330** reserved for History Major and Medial students. These small courses provide an in-depth training in historical methods and encourage active discussion among student peers and with instructors.

Students must receive a **minimum grade of C+** in their Core Seminar in order to enroll **Upper-Year Seminars** in third and fourth year. The Core Seminar is required to progress in a History degree, so make sure to enroll for 2022–2023!

QUICK TIPS:

Enrolling in a Core Seminar can be competitive


When your enrolment appointment begins, **enroll in your core seminar first**, before any electives, to ensure you have the best chance at securing a seat in your top choice.

HISTORY DEGREE PLANS

MAJOR PLAN: 120 UNITS TOTAL

60-units of History courses + 60-units of electives

• 1. Core Requirements: 30-units broken down as follows:

- A. 6-units from HIST at the 100-level OR BISC 100 OR BISC 101
- B. 6-units from HIST 300-330 (core seminar taken in second year)
- C. 18-units from HIST 333-499 (upper-year seminars taken in years 3+4)

• 2. Option Requirements: 30-units broken down as follows:

- A. 15-units from HIST at the 200 level
- B. 9-units from HIST at the 200 level OR HIST at the 500 level
- o C. 6-units from HIST at the 100 level OR 200 level OR HIST_Subs

• 3. Additional Requirements: 6-units of Canadian History

MEDIAL PLAN: 120-UNITS TOTAL

42-units of History courses + 42-units of another discipline + 36-units of electives

• 1. Core Requirements: 24-units broken down as follows:

- A. 6-units from HIST at the 100-level OR BISC 100 OR BISC 101
- B. 6-units from HIST 300-330 (core seminar taken in second year)
- C. 12-units from HIST 333-499 (upper-year seminars taken in years 3+4)

• 2. Option Requirements: 18-units broken down as follows:

- A. 6-units from HIST at the 200 level
- o B. 6-units from HIST at the 200 level OR HIST at the 500 level
- o C. 6-units from HIST at the 100 level OR 200 level OR HIST_Subs

• 3. Additional Requirements: 6-units of Canadian History

TYPICAL PLAN PATTERNS

HISTORY MAJOR

Year 1	Two 3-unit 100-level History courses
Year 2	Core seminar (HIST 300–330); and 9–12 units of 200-level lecture classes (HIST 200–299)
Year 3	Two or three upper-year seminars (HIST 333-499); and 9-12 units of 200-level classes
Year 4	Three or four upper-year seminars (HIST 333-499); and 6-9 units of 200-level classes (HIST 200-299)

HISTORY MEDIAL

Year 1	Two 3-unit 100-level History courses
Year 2	Core seminar (HIST 300–330); and 6–9 units of 200-level lecture classes (HIST 200–299)
Year 3	Two upper-year seminars (HIST 333-499); and 6 units of 200-level classes (HIST 200-299)
Year 4	Two upper-year seminars (HIST 333-499); and 3-6 units of 200-level classes (HIST 200-299)





OPPORTUNITIES IN HISTORY

History Major and Medial students have the option to undertake independent research courses as well as experience-based learning in a variety of internships.

INDEPENDENT RESEARCH

Undergraduate students can work on an independent research project under the supervision of a faculty member in one of History's independent research courses. Applications are due in the summer preceding the student's fourth year. In these courses, students can expand upon a research paper that was written for an upper-year seminar course, explore a new topic they didn't get the chance to study during their classes, or pursue an independent reading program while on exchange. INTERNSHIPS

Experiential learning courses provide students with an opportunity to apply their rich academic background in history in a practical professional context. HIST 212 offers a wide variety of placements with local, national, and international partners, while HIST 501/502 offer students the opportunity to work in the Queen's Archives.
