	Major outreach project is underway thanks to the \$1,000,000 donation from the Sprott Foundation and other funding through the Suncor Energy Foundation. D. Lussier - Question for the representative of the Faculty of Law about the early outreach and student recruitment, why does the current 1st year Law School class have 0 Indigenous learners enrolled? Answer: K. Banks: Stacia Loft is leading this initiative and there have been no acceptances despite offers. Research is required to determine why no offers have been accepted.		
5. Review of Enrolment Results	C. Coupland - Reviewed admission statistics (applications, offers, and acceptances). Notes: The acceptance number is the highest it's been historically due to strong support from the Indigenous Recruitment Coordinator and the Four Directions Indigenous Student Centre by providing counseling and advising services.		
	Question: D. Lussier: Does the University currently track and monitor barriers and identify gaps that could be affecting Indigenous Learners from being admitted into programs? Answer: C. Coupland explained that yes, the current practice is to monitor and track these issues. Additionally, it can be noted that typically 70% of Indigenous Applicants in this pool qualify for an offer.	C. 	D. Lussier commented that perhaps it would be helpful to have a table that identifies any missing pieces or prerequisites required for Indigenous learners to apply to certain programs. This would aid in limiting the number of applications being rejected.		
	M. Henry brought up that the University currently has the Indigenous Student		

	Verification Committee who reviews applications individually for Students, Staff, and Faculty. Additionally, M. Henry made a note that within the Office of Indigenous Initiatives there is an Indigenous Pathways Coordinator who is finalizing their report on the issues that we see around the gaps for Indigenous Learners in accessing post-secondary education. Lastly, M. Henry stated that there should be more conversations regarding the support and retention of Indigenous learners rather than solely focusing on the recruitment piece.		
	C. Coupland: The University has redeveloped the Indigenous Student Handbook with new content and it's currently in the final stages of approval to be printed and posted to the website.		
6. OII Updates	 The search for OII AVP is currently underway, hoping for early 2025 start. The Campus commitment to NDTR this year increased significantly: Student engagement and the AMS dedicated many meaningful activities and participation towards NDTR. T-shirt sales were based off a sliding scale from \$5-20 to ensure affordability for students Non-perishable food items were also accepted as a donation for a t-shirt to give to the Kingston Native Centre and Language Nest, to support the urban Indigenous community 	M. 	 The Outdoor Indigenous Gathering Space has continued to be utilized as classroom space as intended. Oll is currently working with the CTL to encourage reoccurring bookings for the space. Additionally, the space has been used for events and ceremonies on campus. ISSF reporting has shifted to follow a 3-year model as opposed to annually. All submitted funding has been allocated and the ISSF currently supports 4 different programs.
