

YOUR COURSES

What can I study at ANU?

A full course load at ANU is 24 ANU units per semester (usually 4 courses at 6 units each). Students can take 18 units (3 courses at 6 units each) with the permission of their home institution.

You can view all of our available courses through the ANU Programs and courses webpage;

programsandcourses.anu.edu.au/Search. From here you will need to select 'Courses' from the main subject heading and then enter the appropriate search parameters; commencement year, career and session. You can then narrow the search by entering your area of interest or field of study in the search bar.

The most important areas to reference on this webpage are the "Learning Outcomes" and how that will apply to your full degree program at your home institution, the "Requisite and Incompatibility" section and if you have the required knowledge and prerequisite evidence to meet these requirements and the "Offerings and Dates" section to ensure it will be available in the semester you are attending ANU.

Key terms

Permission codes: For most ANU courses, other than 1000 level courses, you will need permission from an ANU Course Convenor before you are able to enrol. Once you nominate your courses, we will seek a permission code from the academic colleges which will be provided on a case-by-case basis based on whether they deem you have met the pre-requisite requirements.

Undergraduate courses: UG students should be selecting 1000 – 3000 level courses only. Some courses may be restricted to students undertaking particular ANU degrees or study options and are not available to other students. 4000 Level – these courses are, typically, restricted to ANU Honours students only.

Postgraduate Courses: 6000 – 8000 Level – these courses are PG level and not available to students at a UG level.

WHY EXCHANGE OR STUDY ABROAD AT ANU?

We are home to a community of bright and engaged students who come from across Australia and around the world. Coming to ANU, you will become part of a small and friendly community located in the heart of the nation, where decisions that chart the future of society are made.

Academic breadth

The seven academic colleges together teach approximately 200 majors and over 5,000 courses. Some more detail is given in the following pages. ANU has 17 language majors including Japanese, Korean, Indonesian, German and French. We encourage students to take up beginners' courses in a new language or further their knowledge by taking intermediary or advanced language lessons if they meet the prerequisites.

A cross-disciplinary approach to education

We encourage students to take up different subjects in different colleges/ faculties; there are generally no restrictions to be doing a select number of courses at one college and the rest at another. As long as the student meets pre-requisites, the student could be doing all four courses (a full semester workload) at different academic colleges.

Strong STEM focus

ANU plays an important national role in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

Our world renowned researchers are working at the forefront of global challenges and specialise in everything from addressing climate change and predicting tsunamis, to developing the world's highest efficiency solar cell and leading major advances in stem cell science for a new era of regenerative medicine. ANU ranks 1 in Australia and 28 in the world for physical sciences.

International Relations and Politics

The University's proximity to government, parliament and the diplomatic corps delivers a unique experience for students with an interest in international relations. The ANU Department of International Relations is a leading centre for the study of global politics. With one of the world's largest concentrations of Asia Pacific expertise, students have access to a network of scholars and graduates who provide policy advice at the highest levels in Australia, the Asia Pacific and beyond.

Australian National Internships Program

Established by ANU in 1993, the Australian National Internships Program (ANIP) has already provided over 1,500 students with the opportunity to undertake a significant research project within a workplace. ANU Academic Skills and Learning Centre


Living on campus

- > are in their first year of study at ANU, starting in their first semester, whether that is Semester 1 or 2
- > are enrolled full-time





Accomodation

ANU has eleven different residences for undergraduate students. You can nominate a fully catered, self-catered or apartment-style residence. All have laundry facilities, outdoor spaces and study rooms, and are within easy walking distance to shops, cafes, restaurants, sporting facilities, nightlife and public transport. 

YOUR COMMUNITY

ANU Exchange Network

The ANU Exchange Network works closely with the Global Programs team to host events during your time at ANU. 
Clubs and Societies

YOUR WEEKEND GETAWAYS

Canberra is situated in an ideal location allowing its residents access to so many amazing weekend getaways. Just hours away from the beach in summer and the snow in winter, there are endless opportunities available for anyone who likes to explore.



Bateman's Bay

A 2 hour drive will take you to the South Coast central hub of Bateman's Bay. From here you can get to a variety of beaches for whale watching, surfing, swimming or simply just to enjoy the sand between your toes. Jarvis Bay, home of the whitest sand beaches in the world, is only 2.5 hours drive from Canberra.

Each semester the ANU Global Programs team runs a Surf Camp with Surf Camp Australia where students are taken for a weekend away to learn how to surf with the experts.

Snow and Jindabyne

A 2 hour drive will get you to Jindabyne; the gateway to Thredbo & Perisher ski fields and Mount Kosciusko. During the winter months of June – September this is the perfect ski or snowboard get away and during the warmer months you will be able to climb Mount Kosciusko; the highest peak in Australia.

Blue Mountains

The Blue Mountains is home to the Three Sister Mountains, Jenolan Caves and the steepest incline railway in the world! This picturesque location is the perfect place to escape for the weekend and is only a 4 hour drive away.

Sydney

Great Barrier Reef and Far North Queensland

One of the seven natural wonders of the world, a UNESCO world heritage site and the largest living thing on Earth. The Great Barrier Reef is an absolute must see destination for anyone coming to Australia.

The Great Ocean Road

A 243km stretch of road, the Great Ocean Road is the largest war memorial in the world; dedicated to Australian soldiers killed during World War 1. A hub for wildlife spotting and home to the Twelve Apostles and Loch Ard Gorge, the Great Ocean Road is a great place to spend a day or a weekend.





Uluru

Housed in the Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park, Uluru is a sacred sandstone monolith within the Australian indigenous culture. Located in Australia's Northern Territory near Alice Springs, this unique and culturally significant site is a great place to visit if you have some time before or after your exchange or during your midsemester break.

YOUR TICKET TO MAKE IT HAPPEN

Exchange

If your home institution (the institution you are completing your degree at) has an exchange agreement with ANU then you may be able to secure an exchange place for a semester or year abroad. Through this agreement you are not required to pay any course fees to ANU!

Study Abroad

If your home institution does not have an exchange agreement with ANU, you can still study here for a single semester or full year under our Study Abroad Program. You will pay tuition fees upfront to ANU for your study period but will have access to the same support, services and courses as exchange students. You may also be eligible for a reduced fee rate if your home institution has a Study Abroad agreement with ANU.

Eligibility

To be eligible to come to ANU as an exchange or study abroad student you need to meet both the academic and English language requirements.

English

The ANU English Language Requirements for Admissions policy outlines all requirements for a variety of English proficiency tests including IELTS, TOEFL, CAE and CEFR. It also outlines alternate ways to meet these requirements with citizenship and prior studies.

Academic

You must have completed (or will have completed upon commencement) at least one year (full time or equivalent) at your home institution with an equivalent of a GPA 4/7 or as per your institutions specific agreement. All equivalencies will undergo a final assessment by the ANU Global Programs team.

YOUR STARTING POINT

Exchange

If you wish to study at ANU as an exchange student, follow these simple steps:

Step 1 Liaise with your home institution regarding their exchange application/nomination process. You must be nominated to ANU by your home institution in the first instance.

Step 2 Submit an exchange application to ANU through the online application portal. Once you have been nominated, you will receive instructions from ANU on how to apply including any appropriate deadlines.

Step 3 Once you receive your ANU Exchange offer you will need to accept it to receive your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment to study at ANU. This will involve either making payment for your OSHC cover to ANU or arranging this independently. Your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) is what you will require for your student visa application.

Step 4 Obtain your visa (if required) and apply for ANU Accommodation. ANU offers guaranteed campus accommodation to undergraduate students coming to ANU for their first time. Postgraduate students will not be covered by this guarantee however, ANU will house as many PG students in campus accommodation as possible.

Step 5 Get excited! The ANU Global Programs team really encourage you to get as excited and engaged as possible. You will be invited to attend a number of sessions and groups in the lead up to your arrival.

Application deadlines

One academic year at ANU is broken into **two** semesters.

Semester 1 (mid February – end June) - apply by 1 November of previous year.

Semester 2 (mid July - end November) - apply by 1 April.

Study Abroad

If you wish to study at ANU as a study abroad student, follow these simple steps:

Step 1 Liaise with your home institution regarding the courses you wish to take at ANU. Your home institution will need to approve you to go on a study abroad program and they will need to know the courses you wish to take are relevant and transferrable to your degree.

Step 2 Submit a study abroad application to ANU through the online application portal. Once you have been approved, you will receive instructions from ANU on how to apply including any appropriate deadlines. If your home institution has a study abroad agreement with ANU, they will also need to nominate you or contact the Global Programs team via email to support your application.

Step 3 Once you receive your ANU Study Abroad offer you will need to accept it to receive your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment to study at ANU. This will involve paying your fees upfront. Your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) is what you will require for your student visa application.

Step 4 Obtain your visa (if required) and apply for ANU Accommodation. ANU offers guaranteed campus accommodation to undergraduate students coming to ANU for their first time. Postgraduate students will not be covered by this guarantee however, ANU will house as many PG students in campus accommodation as possible.

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YOUR ARRIVAL

The ANU Global Programs team runs a comprehensive orientation program.

In the lead up to your arrival at ANU, you will receive countdown information with tips and advice for each stage of your preparation. This will include invites to events, tips on customs and so much more.

Once you arrive at ANU, you will undergo a comprehensive orientation program both exchange/study abroad specific and university wide.

Orientation Week

In a massive collaboration across academic colleges, student groups and central support areas ANU hosts an O-Week at the beginning of every semester. A comprehensive schedule will be available and provided closer to the commencement of semester and gives you access to all the information and support you will need during your time at ANU. From social events to academic advisory sessions to enrolment support the ANU community will have you covered.

Meet and Greet Session

The ANU Global Programs office hosts a Meet and Greet session the Sunday prior to Orientation Week. This session is designed to welcome you to Australia, Canberra and ANU whilst allowing you to create a support network and make friends early on in your journey at ANU. There may even be an animal encounter as part of it!

ANU Airport and Jolimont Centre Welcome

In collaboration with Study Canberra, ANU offers a free 'Airport Welcome' service at the Canberra airport to all new undergraduate, postgraduate and exchange students (including family members travelling with you) to help you arrive in time for Orientation Week.

The service will pick you up from the airport and drop you off at ANU, your ANU hall of residence or at UC Village. You must register for this service and it will only run in the week prior to O-Week. 


