Biography:

Norrin M. Ripsman (Ph.D. University of Pennsylvania) is a Professor in the Political Science Department at Concordia University in Montreal, Canada. His research interests include: democracy and national security, postwar peacemaking, constructing regional stability, the political economy of national security, neoclassical realism, and the impact of globalization on national security. He is the author/co-author of three books, most recently (with Jean-Marc F. Blanchard) *Economic Statecraft and Foreign Policy* (London: Routledge, 2013), a co-editor of three books, most recently (with Steven E. Lobell and Jeffrey W. Taliaferro) *The Challenge of Grand Strategy: The Great Powers and the Broken Balance Between the World Wars* (Cambridge, U.K.: Cambridge University Press, 2012); and the author of over 20 peer-reviewed articles in *International Security*, *International Studies Quarterly*, *Security Studies*, *Millennium: A Journal of International Studies*, *International Interactions*, *International Studies Review*, *Geopolitics*, *International Journal*, and *The Canadian Journal of Political Science*.
