The Department of Psychology at Queen's University invites applications from qualified candidates interested in teaching a course in **Introduction to Clinical Psychology (PSYC 236/3.0)**. This is an online course with an expected enrolment of 120 students. This is a fall term appointment for the period of September 1 - December 31, 2026, with the course in session from September 8 – December 8, 2026, with the exam period from December 10 – 23, 2026.

Additional compensated hours may be available in early January, including managing and grading deferred exams and handling any grade appeals. All additional available work will be agreed to by the Employer and the TF in advance of the commencement of the duties and a new Teaching Fellow Form shall be completed when there are extra hours paid.

Candidates should be enrolled in a M.Sc. or a Ph.D. program in Psychology or Neuroscience at Queen's and have teaching experience at the University level in Psychology, including experience working with a Learning Management System (such as OnQ).

As this course is being offered online, successful candidates will also:

- have regular access to high-speed internet and a computer that meets current specifications
- be willing to take an active role in delivering the course and communicating regularly with students
- be open to learning how to use new technologies in order to be an effective instructor in the virtual environment
- be flexible in terms of availability during online office hours
- be willing to provide students with timely and constructive feedback on OnQ
- be comfortable with working in a partnership with Arts and Science Online and the Psychology Undergraduate Office in the delivery of the course

This online course is already developed. Teaching duties would primarily consist of identifying content that needs to be updated, assisting in updating those materials where relevant, engaging students throughout the course to facilitate their learning and provide feedback, developing assessments and grading procedures as relevant, ensuring timely and accurate student feedback, ensuring academic regulations are followed, and training and supporting teaching assistants. The instructor will have support through the Undergraduate Office in Psychology if questions arise.

The University invites applications from all qualified individuals. Queen's is strongly committed to employment equity, diversity and inclusion in the workplace and encourages applications from Black, racialized/visible minority and Indigenous people, women, persons with disabilities, and 2SLGBTQ+ persons. All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply; however, in accordance with Canadian immigration requirements, Canadian citizens and permanent residents of Canada will be given priority. Please indicate in your application if you have a valid legal work status in Canada. Applications from all qualified candidates will be

considered in the applicant pool. In order to support your employment at Queen's, we require you to indicate whether or not you will need a work permit.
