### NSERC Undergraduate Student Research Awards - Selection Criteria for Queen's Psychology Department

- Eligibility: The NSERC USRA is a competitive award. Students registered in a 4-year Honours degree program in Queen's PSYC, and who are in 2nd, 3rd or 4th year and have a minimum cumulative GPA of 4.0 (A) will be given priority. First year students are not eligible, and students with cumulative GPA <3.70 are not likely to be competitive for consideration.
- 2. Ranking of applicants will be based on three main criteria: (1) PSYC GPA for all completed PSYC courses, (2) student research interest statement, (3) cumulative GPA and the supplemental factors described below.
- 3. Supplemental factors: The PSYC NSERC USRA Committee aims to distribute the available awards over all years of study (2,3,4). The PSYC NSERC USRA Committee will favour a first-time applicant over a returning applicant that has been awarded an NSERC USRA already, if all else is equal in the interest of sharing the limited number of awards among promising students.

### **NOTES:**

The work conducted under an NSERC USRA project is not to overlap work with work in PSYC501, 570/575, or SWEP research projects (research projects carried out under the Queen's Summer Work Experience Program). This is so that dual credit is not assigned for the same work.
