Administrative Developments

The QRDC was open 6 additional days in the summer of 2014, from July 18 to August 22, (open *Friday*, as well as the normal Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday hours) to meet researcher demand for access and vetting.

There was turnover in membership on QRDC Advisory Committee, with Jean-Etienne De Bettignies replacing Olena Ivus (*both Professors from the School of Business*), and Michael Kottelenberg replacing Kamin Peyrow (*both graduate students in Economics*). Our thanks to Olena and Kamin for their contributions to the Advisory Committee.

Queen's Faculty

Professor Chris Ferrall (*Queen's Economics*) held several *fee-for-service* contracts in the QRDC. Professor Ross Finnie (*Public and International Affairs, U of Ottawa*) held a *fee-for-service* contract shared with Toronto, Queen's, and COOL (Carleton, Ottawa, Outaouais) RDCs. Funds from these contracts helped lower the amount of our Statistics Canada Service invoice.

Professor Vincent Pohl (*Queen's, Policy Studies*) laid the groundwork for a graduate-level methods course in the QRDC: **ECON 882 – Research Problems and Methodology**, scheduled to be taught in the Winter 2015 academic term.

Course Description:

ECON 882 - Research Problems and Methodology

Professor: Vincent Pohl

Students will identify an ambitious research project and acquire the skills and resources necessary to carry out the project. From their starting points students will identify and develop a research topic over the semester. This topic/plan may indeed become the student's summer research essay, but this is not required. The expectation is that the student will be in an excellent position to complete their essay quickly during the summer if it relates to their Econ 882 topic. Students will investigate all aspects of their topic, including an extensive literature review, the historical origins of the issue/method/controversy. They will identify the methods used by current work in the area and teach themselves the methods through their study group. Students who wish to use the QRDC to access data for their summer essay are encouraged to enroll in Econ 882. The process of getting QRDC access becomes one part of Econ 882.

QRDC Security

In response to demands from Statistics Canada regarding RDC security, a new swipe-card security system was installed in April-May 2014. This new system provides vastly improved tracking and reporting of QRDC access/egress – a key reporting requirement of Statistics Canada. Each QRDC researcher is issued a personal swipe card that is used to enter and leave the QRDC. Cards only work during scheduled QRDC hours. The Statistical Analyst can now track and report QRDC use to Statistics Canada for security purposes.

Vignette 1

Do the perils of Universal Child Care depend on the child's age? -- The rising participation of women in paid work has not only heightened demand for universal early education and care programs but also led to increased use of childcare amongst children at earlier ages. Prior research investigating Quebec's universal highly subsidized childcare documented significant declines in a variety of developmental outcomes for all children aged 0–4 years. However, past analysis has not explored whether these effects vary for children of different ages. In this article, we demonstrate substantial heterogeneity in policy impacts by child age. Children who gain access to subsidized childcare at earlier ages experience significantly larger negative impacts on developmental scores, health, and behavioral outcomes. The sole exception is the negative relationship between access to subsidized childcare and hyperactivity scores which steepens with child age. Our analysis additionally provides significant evidence of treatment effect heterogeneity within ages, and reveals benefits from access to universal childcare on developmental scores for those that are above 3 years of age. <http://cesifo.oxfordjournals.org/content/60/2/338.abstract>

Criterion 7: Summary of Major Achievements and Challenges for the past year (2014)

2014 was a year of steady activity for Queen's Research Data Centre (QRDC). Working with our Statistical Analyst, and new Regional Manager, Tina Hotton, a new Statistical Assistant was hired, replacing Regan Butler, who left the QRDC after two productive years. Our new Statistical Assistant, Jing (Jean) Liang, started in June 2014.

The new network environment in the QRDC worked well in 2014. This CFI-funded infrastructure upgrade brought the QRDC up to 'standard' in the CRDCN. There were no major technology-related problems identified through the course of the year.

A new swipe card security system was installed, improving our security-reporting capacity (regular reports of QRDC accesses are required by Statistics Canada). After a few minor initial issues were addressed by the system provider, the system appears to be working well.

Once again, Queen's University Library, in coordination with University Research Services, provided effective administrative support and oversight for all QRDC finances, including SSHRC, CIHR, and CFI grants.

Queen's IT Services, and on occasion, the Library's system support team, provided effective support for the QRDC. A variety of hardware and software needs were addressed over the course of the year.

The 2014 Researcher Survey ran well. Key content for this Annual Report was provided from the CRDCN, based on survey responses and Statistics Canada's Program Manager Report. Some refinement/checking took place at our end to adjust for details missed by the central processing done by the CRDCN. Discussions with the CRDCN helped resolve any issues that arose.

The June, 2014 QRDC Advisory Committee meeting focused on refreshing committee membership, specifically encouraging RDC researchers to participate on the committee. This meeting also included discussions of budget and grants, staffing changes, and other administrative reporting. See approved minutes at:

The September, 2014 meeting of the QRDC Advisory Committee focused on gathering feedback from RDC researchers. We asked researchers who are members of the Advisory Committee, as well as an invited researcher, to share their thoughts. Questions asked of researchers included:

- How can we improve researchers' QRDC experience?
- How can we attract more researchers to the QRDC?
- What can be done to encourage graduate student use of the QRDC?

Minutes of this meeting, once approved, will be posted to the QRDC web site.

The Academic Director continued to promote the QRDC in educational sessions, in individual consultations with researchers, and via blog posts to the QRDC website.

Criterion 8: Major Objectives and foreseeable Challenges for next year

2015 should be a year of growth and development for the CRDCN and the QRDC. There are several activities and challenges underway or on the horizon. These include:

- Contributing to the 'metadata' section of a CFI Cyber-Infrastructure Challenge 1 grant application by the CRDCN.
- Supporting a graduate course offered in the QRDC (e.g. in the form of increased QRDC hours in the Spring and Summer of 2015) and encouraging more courses to be undertaken using the QRDC.
- Working with the Statistical Analyst on an RDC Research Contract to better understand the operation of the QRDC from a researcher's

perspective, and to gain first-hand experience using the surveys and infrastructure available in the RDC.

- Working to improve the Researcher Survey, both for researchers and for Academic Directors.
- Continuing to work with QUL, ITS, University Research Services, and outside contractors (e.g. Security System installers) to effectively administer the QRDC.
- Coordinate and cooperate with external agencies (Statistics Canada, SSHRC, CFI, etc.) to meet existing and emerging policy requirements. For example, the Federal Government, and hence Statistics Canada, is changing its security policies. We have been told this will result in increased security vetting of researchers applying for access to the QRDC. Preliminary information suggests that this will involve *fingerprinting* for identification purposes (*currently only done on a random basis*) and *credit checks*. This was first announced to Academic Directors at their April, 2014 meeting. Directors were unanimous and vocal in expressing their concerns about the negative effects these policies would have on use of RDCs. More information will be provided when it becomes available.
