Deadline to accept offer of admission for students attending an Ontario high school

Residence application and deposit deadline

July 2-31

Summer Orientation to Academics and Resources (SOAR)

July 15

Deadline for final grades and confirmation of OSSD for Ontario high school students.

August 1

Final transcript deadline for students not currently studying in an Ontario high school.

September 3

First day of classes

- By Air The closest major international airport is Toronto Pearson (YYZ), but Kingston is also accessible from Ottawa (YOW) and Montreal (YUL).


