Student entrepreneurship success: Diane Kelly chats with Greg Bavington, Executive Director Dunin-Deshpande Queen's Innovation Centre



Are you familiar with the <u>Dunin-Deshpande Queen's Innovation</u>
<u>Centre</u> (DDQIC)? We had an opportunity to learn all about this exciting Centre from the Executive Director, <u>Greg Bavington</u>. And to catch your attention, some say the Queen's Innovation Centre programs and results put it among the top five entrepreneurship centres in North America!

The Innovation Centre was created in 2012 as a collaboration between faculty and entrepreneurial alumni, and because of generous gifts in 2016 from the Dunin and Deshpande



Queen's has been supportive of the Centre's mission and provides its students with wonderful state-of-the-art space in Mitchell Hall. The **Rose Innovation Hub** is equipped with 10 meeting rooms, lounges, and coworking spaces, the DDQIC Rose Event Commons for hosting large gatherings, and a student-run oncampus makerspace, all of which is available for use by students.

And you don't have to be a member of Queen's to take advantage of the Centre's resources. Members from other universities can participate in the training and opportunities

The Centre began as a lean start-up, its mission to encourage, enable and support the innovation activities of students, faculty, entrepreneurs, regional and Canadian companies by providing incubators, accelerators, joint courses, workshops, internship opportunities, seminars, and business plan competitions.

What does it provide our students? Greg said that, while Queen's students learn certain academic skills, many of which are program-specific, it may be difficult for a student leaving a particular discipline to access the broad range of skills necessary to examine, understand, and try to resolve today's complex issues and challenges. The Innovation Centre's mission is to help students bridge those gaps, whether it be through entrepreneurship skills training, encouraging teamwork across disciplines, enabling the understanding of the results that can be achieved by pulling together as a team, or providing experiential learning opportunities.

For example, the Queen's **Innovation Centre Summer** Initiative (QICSI), the Centre's flagship program, gives participants training, mentorship, funding, and office space to launch their own startup that solves a defined problem. Building on the success of QICSI, the Centre helped develop the Master of **Management Innovation and Entrepreneurship program** (MMIE) In the Smith School of Business that equips graduates with the skills to handle any entrepreneurial endeavour, from the formation of a start-up, to embarking on social innovation activities, to looking at innovation within a corporate environment. If you go onto the Centre's website, in addition to QICSI and formal entrepreneurship courses leading to degrees and certificates,

available at the Centre as do students from Africa. These international connections have resulted in productive student exchanges in Africa and India. Greg emphasized that the Centre wants its students to be focussed on the impact of their work and social innovation has become an important component of the programs. The Centre wants its programs to be financially accessible and so it provides a variety of income-producing opportunities and grants for its students.

What is entrepreneurship, we asked? Greg said that an entrepreneurial mindset means that you are comfortable with uncertainty, you have a desire to solve problems but know that there may be a variety of solutions, you want to work with others to achieve your goals, and you believe that you can make a difference. The Centre works on instilling this entrepreneurial mindset in its students.

A measure of the success of the Centre is the fact that there is a 49 percent survival rate among the companies that are created by its students, a number that far exceeds the standard survival rate of start-ups in Canada.

Greg is proud of the fact that the Centre has opened the innovation door to a wide variety of students, not just engineering and MBA grads. Everyone in the entrepreneurial field knows that arts and humanities students bring essential skills to and have a role to play in the creation and sustainability of new organizations.

Greg is especially proud of the relationship the Centre has forged with the City of Kingston in its efforts to encourage entrepreneurship in the City and works closely with the City on projects like the Mayor's Innovation Challenge.

you will see a whole suite of entrepreneurship programming including online workshops, conferences and clubs on innovation, pitch competitions, a mentorship network, a makerspace, and more.

Spectra Plasmonics (QICSI 2017) - https://www.spectraplasmonics.com

Spectra Plasmonics delivers a chemical sensor for applications including food safety, forensics, and law enforcement. With state-of-the-art capability, this device saves time and money in detecting trace levels of harmful compounds in complex mixtures.

RockMass Technologies (QICSI 2016) - https://www.rockmasstech.com

Rockmass Technologies enhances the process of geotechnical surveying and data acquisition by improving safety, efficiency, and accuracy. The device automatically maps a rock face while the software analyses the data and breaks it down into key information that is used to determine the structural stability of a tunnel, mine shaft and/or rock face.

Mosaic Manufacturing (QICSI 2014) - https://www.mosaicmfg.com

Mosaic Manufacturing created a stand-alone device that attaches to a 3D printer and allows for even and clean printing in colour. Mosaic gained 464 backers and \$231,803 CAD in their Kickstarter campaign in 2015 and are now shipping their product.

CleanSlate UV is a biosafety company creating the next generation of intelligent sanitization solutions. They leverage the power of UV-C light to kill the most dangerous bacteria and viruses without damaging devices.

Quick hits: Pension and benefits

Pension update: With the shift to the University Pension Plan (UPP), updates on the rate of investment return will be provided only annually, rather than monthly. This was disappointing news for RAQ but the UPP provided us with their rationale for this decision, which RAQ members can check out at **this link**.

Pension Services plans to issue their usual communique to pension recipients regarding the annual pension adjustment in late November or early December.
