#### **Queen's University Alumni Association (QUAA)** President Update

#### **QUAA Grants**

There are still a few more days to submit an application for a <u>QUAA grant</u>. Alumni and student members of the Queen's community who have an idea for an innovative program that enriches the University may qualify for special project funding from the Queen's University Alumni Association (QUAA). Grants are normally for a few hundred dollars but can go as high as \$2,000.

Generally, the application cycle begins in the fall, but this year with all the transition, the cycle was delayed. Over the past few years, the QUAA Board has spent a great deal of time revamping the application and selection process to be more transparent, inclusive and equitable. The Giving committee recently presented at a session hosted by the Queen's Student Alumni Association about the application process, in an effort to make it more accessible to anyone who might be interested in applying.

The QUAA Board also has a modest pot of "special projects" funds that it can distribute off-cycle when there is a worthy initiative. If you ever have any questions about this, please reach out!

#### February 7 - VOLUNTEERS NEEDED - Registration deadline for Reader Panel for Commitment Scholars 2025



The <u>Queen's Commitment Scholars Award program</u> celebrates and recognizes demonstrated leadership in, and commitment to, racial justice, social justice, or diversity initiatives by a student in their high school or in their community. The award provides dedicated financial, academic, and career support to help students complete their degree.

Readers are needed to review applications beginning in late-February.

#### As a Commitment Scholars Reader, your role will include:

- Completing an <u>online asynchronous education session of Unpacking Normalized Bias in Admissions, from</u> the Human Rights and Equity Office, before starting your application review.
- Reviewing and scoring an average of 25-30 applications through our online reader portal (NetID required).
- Each application includes 2 short essay questions (800 words and 400 words). These will be provided along with a scoring sheet and guide.
- In general, it takes around 10 hours to complete the review process.
- You are not required to attend any meetings.

#### Timeline:

- Please complete this <u>short form</u> to register as a Commitment Scholars Reader by February 6, 2025.
- You will receive more information in mid-February.
- Links to individualized online reader packages containing your Commitment Scholars Award applications will be sent by email on **Tuesday**, **February 25**, **2025**.
- All reader rankings will be due online by Wednesday, March 19, 2025.

**February 17-20 – Family Day (observed holiday),** followed by Mid-term Reading Week (all classes cancelled, except Education and Medicine)


# Calling for volunteers to help judge at this year's GRADflix showcase, 3 Minute Thesis and 3 Minute Research events.

The School of Graduate Studies and Postdoctoral Affairs will be hosting some events this term to showcase grad and postdoc research. **We are seeking your support to be a judge!** Of course, feel free to come along and just watch the events.

At this stage we do not know how many graduate students or postdocs intend to participate in any of these events. But provided we get sufficient numbers we will be hosting them and will require judges. We therefore ask if you are interested in being a volunteer judge for one or all of the events listed below. 
#### February 26th (noon - 1pm, Kinesiology 100) GRADflix Showcase

(judging will be held the week 17<sup>th</sup> – 21<sup>st</sup> February)



- Graduate students create videos that are 1 minute or less to convey their research. Sort of like a research trailer.
- Judges evaluate student videos on communication, creativity, and technical quality
- Judging will be done asynchronously and remotely prior to the final event.
- This event focused on students developing and practicing research communication skills with new technologies

#### Three Minute Thesis and Three Minute Research



We need judges for both events, and it is our hope that we can call upon alumni to consider this volunteer opportunity. It is not the easiest job to judge presentations that only last 3 minutes, but we have a rubric and guideline for the 3 areas we are assessing, namely communication, comprehension, and engagement. See our website for an outline.

This type of presentation is to train the students and postdocs how to present their research to a non-specialist audience (understanding who your audience is). <u>Here is a link to the 2023 year's final to get an idea of what it looks like</u>. The events themselves, depending on number of participants for each should last between 60 – 90 minutes.

#### March 21st (1:00-3:00 pm, Stauffer Library room 014) - 3 Minute Research,

- Postdocs present their research in 3 minutes or less using 1 static slide
- Judges evaluate presenters on communication, comprehension, and engagement
- Smaller, in-person event; previous years had 5-8 participants
- Cash prizes for top presenters

#### March 26th (5:00-6:30 pm, Kinesiology 101) - 3 Minute Thesis Final

- Graduate students present their research in 3 minutes or less using 1 static slide
- Judges evaluate presenters on communication, comprehension, and engagement
- Typically, 8-12 presenters for the final
- Overall winner receives a cash prize and represents Queen's at provincial competition (last year's winner, Julia Tropak, won at the Ontario 3MT and competed nationally where she came 3rd!)
