- **Guest Services** assist with guest check-in, provide directions and information, guide guests to seating, ensuring a welcoming and efficient environment for all convocation attendees.

Revitalized John Deutsch University Centre JDUC



The John Deutsch University Centre (JDUC), located on the corner of University Avenue and Union Street, is used by students, staff, faculty, and alumni for a variety of purposes and is a key hub for student life at Queen's. It is home to the Alma Mater Society, the Society of Graduate and Professional Students, the Office of the Rector, the Student Experience Office (SEO), numerous student clubs, a pub, and a print and copy centre. At the heart of the JDUC is the ceilidh (pronounced kay'lee), a large open space where members of the community come together to celebrate, debate, innovate, and create. The ceilidh will be renamed the lim Leech Ceilidh Centre in his honour

Reopening in May 2025, the renovated building will again house the student government offices, and feature dedicated Graduate Student space, accommodation for more than 100 student clubs, 6,000 square feet of new public study spaces, secure and discreet wellness spaces, a larger pub with a patio, an expanded Common Ground Coffee House and Tricolour Outlet.

Tricolour award recipient Hannah Burrows co-authored a book to help <u>Pay for Post-Secondary: A Student's Guide for Securing Financial Aid.</u> It is available on Open Library and has had in excess of 10,000 copies downloaded since it's release in June 2024.
