KEYNOTE SPEAKER DR. DAVID PHIPPS, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, RESEARCH & INNOVATION SERVICES:



Dr. David Phipps is the Executive Director of Research & Innovation Services at York University. He leads York's award-winning Knowledge Mobilization Unit, which provides services to researchers, community organizations, and government agencies who wish to maximize the economic, social and environmental impacts of university research, and has a PhD in Immunology from Queen's University. He is also the Knowledge Translation Lead for Kids Brain Health Network of Centres of Excellence, and the Network Director for Research Impact Canada, Canada's knowledge mobilization network.

In 2012 Phipps was awarded a Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal in recognition of his work in knowledge mobilization. In 2013 he was one of three national finalists for the Impact Award – Connections category from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada. He was also awarded the 2015 Research Management Excellence Award (Canadian Association of Research Administrators) and 2015 President's Award for Innovation in Knowledge Mobilization (Institute for Knowledge Mobilization).
